Environmental issues are becoming increasingly important in Australia and worldwide, so come and hear about how some of these challenges are faced head on.

Panellists include:

Peter Kanowski is Professor of Forestry at the ANU Fenner School of Environment & Society (fennerschool.anu.edu.au); he is currently on extended leave as Deputy Director General of the Center for International Forestry Research (www.cifor.org). Peter's academic work focuses principally on forest policy and governance. Prior to his membership of the 2011 SoE Committee, he has played significant roles in various forest-related policy processes at international, national, state and local levels.

Steven Cork is an ecologist and futurist. As an ecologist he spent 25 years in CSIRO researching the interactions between humans and the natural environment around the world. As a futurist he played a leading role in developing scenarios for the World's social-ecological futures for the United Nations' Millennium Ecosystem Assessment and has run similar projects with government and non-government groups around Australia. He has worked extensively as an advisor to governments on policy issues and as a government employee developing and implementing environmental policy. He now works privately as a futurist, strategist and ecological advisor as the Principal Consultant of Ecolnsights and leads a project on the resilience of Australia in the private sustainability R&D organisation Australia21. He is an adjunct Professor in the Crawford School of Public Policy at the Australian National University. He was a member of the committee that prepared the 2011 National State of the Environment Report.

Nancy Dahl Tacconi is the Director of the National Environmental Reporting section in the Australian Government Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Populations and Communities. She has worked with the department in decision-support and science management roles for over 10 years. Most recently, she was the project manager for the latest five-yearly national State of Environment report (SoE 2011), coordinating all aspects of the project from initial plans through to delivery of the report and a review of its impacts.

Kylie Evans is the principal Communications Writer and Editor for Biotext. She has written and edited documents for a range of clients, including the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care, Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing, ACT Government, Pedestrian Council of Australia, and the World Health Organization. One of her most important projects has been substantive editing and informational design for the Australia State of the Environment report for the Australian Government Department of Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities.

Speakers:

Kylie Walker is Director of Communications and Outreach at the Australian Academy of Science. After more than a decade in mainstream journalism in Sydney, Perth and the federal press gallery, she has spent the past six years as a Canberra-based communications professional advocating on the federal political and media stages for not-for-profit and membership groups in the health and science sectors.

Simon Copland is Science Communications Officer in the Colleges of Medicine, Biology and Environment; and Physical and Mathematical Sciences at the Australian National University (ANU). He is experienced in a range of science communication activities and is currently studying his Masters in Science Communication. He is also an active writer – he is the political editor of FUSE Magazine and has published material in ABC's The Drum, New Matilda and the Sydney Star Observer.

Chris Cassella is Managing Director of ScienceAlert Pty Ltd, an ex-Microsoft programmer and failed neuroscientist. Over the last five years, he has transformed ScienceAlert into the #1 provider of science news on Facebook. With almost two million fans worldwide, ScienceAlert's Facebook page is more popular than the Wall Street Journal, Time Magazine and the Economist. Chris is a strong proponent of Facebook as a platform to inspire and engage young people around the world with science.

Janet Salisbury has a background in cancer research and 10 years of postdoctoral research experience. Since 1990, she has built up her own company, Biotext, a science information consultancy specialising in health, biomedical science, agriculture and the environment. Janet's work has covered topics such as evidence-based medicine, infectious diseases, air and water quality, and sustainable development. She has an interest in the interaction of scientists, decision makers and the public in the development of science policy.

Mary Mulcahy is Communication Manager for CSIRO's Energy Group. She has oversight of the Energy Group communications strategy, and leads a national team responsible for communicating about the outcomes from CSIRO energy research to government, industry and community. After completing a science degree, Mary's first job was as an ecologist with the Tasmanian Inland Fisheries Commission looking at instream flow requirements for four major Tasmanian rivers. After a stint as a high school teacher, and completing a Graduate Diploma in Science Communication, Mary worked in a range of education outreach programs including managing the Graduate Diploma in Scientific Communication at ANU and Questacon and then took on the challenge of helping to set up a similar interactive science centre in Malaysia. Following that, she managed the science outreach centre at the University of New South Wales and then joined the University of Technology in Sydney to manage research communications across the University.

One of the greatest challenges surrounding the climate change debate is how to effectively communicate its impact to policy makers and the wider community. Are the messages getting to the right people and being communicated in the best way?

This hands-on workshop will take you one step beyond the evaluation basics and get you started on ways to produce meaningful evaluation data. You will get a chance to scrutinise your objectives, work out how to align your objectives with what you are trying to evaluate, and consider what evaluation tools and techniques will work for your project.
