National Science Week is Australia's annual celebration of science and technology.



Official launch of Perth Science Festival and National Science Week 2016

Established in 1997, National Science Week provides an opportunity to acknowledge the contributions of Australian scientists and innovators to the world.

In 2016 over 1,806 events were held across Australia, engaging 1.3 million Australians (5% of the population). Of these, over 257 events were held in Western Australia, and 39 online events and/or competitions.

The Perth Science Festival is the largest event on the WA National Science Week calendar and takes place over the first weekend of National Science Week at the Perth Cultural Centre.

In 2016 National Science Week was officially launched at the Perth Science Festival by Her Excellency, the Honourable Kerry Sanderson AC, Governor of Western Australia.



RAC AND THE RAC E-ZONE

The RAC was a new partner in 2016, bringing a large 'E-zone' to the festival that highlighted electric vehicles, the RAC electric highway, and a beebot robotics challenge. Visitors also had the opportunity to learn more about the upcoming trials for self-driving buses coming to Perth in 2016.

"Our volunteers were shocked by how big the event was. Many are studying science at University and they loved the fact that there were so many people celebrating science in WA.




